## PORTLAND STATE UNIVERSITY, PROF. OF ENGLISH AND DIRECTOR OF RHETORIC AND COMPOSITION

Susan Kirtley is an Associate Professor of English, the Director of Rhetoric and Composition, and the Director of Comics Studies at Portland State University. Her research interests include visual rhetoric and graphic narratives, and she has published pieces on comics for the popular press and academic journals. Her book, Lynda Barry: Girlhood through the Looking Glass, was the 2013 Eisner winner for Best Educational/Academic work. She served as a judge for the 2015 Eisner Awards and is currently the Secretary for the Comics Studies Society and a member of the Executive Group on Graphic Narratives for the Modern Language Association.



#### CHRISTINA M. KNOPF SUNY POTSDAM, PROF. OF COMMUNICATION

Christina teaches comics and communications at SUNY's Potsdam campus and advises the college Comic Book Club. She holds a Ph.D. in Communication (political) and Sociology (cultural) from the University at Albany. She is the author of The Comic Art of War: A Critical Study of Military Cartoons, 1805–2014 (McFarland, 2015) and has written or co-authored multiple chapters about depictions of war and gender in comics — including representations of servicewomen in World War II comics, gendered combat and trauma narratives in X-Men movies, and expressions of war in the works of Mike Mignola.



## MICHELLE PARINELLO—CASON FOREST PARK COLLEGE/ SAINT LOUIS UNIVERSITY, PROF. OF ENGLISH

Michelle Parrinello-Cason teaches developmental writing and college rhetoric at Forest Park College. She received her M.A. in English in 2010 and is completing her PhD from Saint Louis University in 2015. Her research interests include developmental education, agonistic rhetoric, identity construction, pop culture studies, and feminism. She also writes at Balancing Jane, a blog that explores the intersections of parenting, pop culture, rhetoric, and feminism.
